


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SYNOPSIS OF POSSIP'S STRONG SCHOOL CLIMATE SERIES

MASLOW'S PYRAMID, INVERTED




Parents' primary concern is that their child's basic needs are met while at school. Once they are confident those needs are met, they can focus on their child's dreams.

1. THE PATH TO SAFER SCHOOLS

Discusses top questions to ask in the complex and often uncomfortable topic of school and community safety in the context of both violence and everyday incidents that undermine the sense of security. The article acknowledges the difficulty in finding answers to safety concerns and emphasizes the importance of starting with questions to explore the underlying issues. There are three forms of safety to consider: physical, emotional, and mental, and suggests beginning with foundational questions about the school and community's philosophy, systems, priorities, and trade-offs regarding safety.

2. COMMUNICATING SAFETY DRILLS AND PROCEDURES TO FAMILIES

Serves as a practical guide for school safety management, stressing the need for detailed planning, careful execution, and transparent communication with all stakeholders to ensure effective safety practices in schools.

3. SECRET SAUCE TO SUCCESSFUL NEWSLETTERS

This article provides guidance on creating effective school newsletters, emphasizing the importance of having a designated writer or committee, not necessarily the principal, for ownership. It suggests maintaining a regular frequency and thoughtful timing for distribution, recommending a consistent and positive tone to engage parents positively. The format should be predictable and organized by importance, incorporating visuals like pictures to enhance engagement and clarity. Including well-being notes can offer additional support to families, and it's crucial to avoid pitfalls such as informal language, excessive visuals, or grammatical errors. Overall, the article stresses the strategic use of newsletters as a tool to strengthen school-family communication and enhance the educational environment.

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

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


